Just two days before that, my wife and I had had to **put our cat down.** It was getting so old and sick that we couldn't **put it off** any longer. Anyway, after two weeks, I couldn't **put up with** my brother-in-law any longer. So I **put him out of** our house.

But even though I sometimes feel **put upon**, I'm thankful to have a loving family and a stable job, and I've been able to **put some money aside** for retirement.

Definitions

to put aside: Keep or save something for later to put away: Return something to its usual place to put down (a person): Insult, humiliate, criticize

to put down (and animal): Kill an animal if it is old or ill (usually done by a veterinarian)

to put in: Invest time or effort

to put (something) off: Delay, postpone

to put on (clothes): Get dressed, start wearing

to put on (weight): Gain weight

to put (someone/something) out of: Remove from (a place, one's mind, etc.)

to put (something) out: Stop from burning, extinguish

to be put out: be upset or irritated

to put (someone) up: Allow someone to stay for a short time

to put up with (something or someone): Tolerate someone or something unpleasant or annoying to be put upon: Be exploited by someone who takes advantage of your wish to be helpful
