“I don’t think I know how to fly either.”

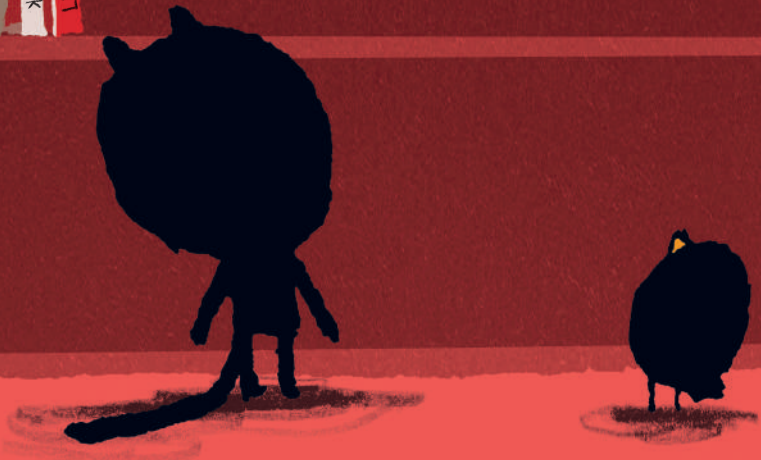


“Follow me,” said Bird. “We’ll go to the library...”
